"Salad Dressing Easter Eggs" - simple marbled beauty for a few pennies:

Real easy and fun to do, even for tiny hands and so pretty! (Credit to *Crouton Crackerjacks*)

What you will need:

- hard boiled or blown out eggs
- white vinegar
- oil
- food coloring
- colander or vented clam shell like this: →
- paper towels
- rubber gloves - optional



What you will do:

Put a few eggs into the colander/clam shell and splash with white vinegar. Starting with your lightest color, put **one** drop of food coloring onto each egg.

Roll the colander around just **a couple of times**. Important: Do NOT roll the eggs more than a couple times or you end up with solid color eggs.

Take your second color and place a drop on just some of the eggs and roll a few more times.

Let sit for at least 5 minutes for the dye to set.

Rinse under cold running water.

Carefully pat dry with a paper towel and let fully dry on a wire rack for at least an hour, longer for blown out eggs because there might be some liquid still inside.

When they are completely dry rub the eggs with a little vegetable oil to make them shiny



A few notes:

- wear rubber gloves if you don't want dye on your hands. It stays on the skin for a few days.
- put plastic wrap on your counter under where you'll be drying the eggs. The dye tends to stain the counter tops.
- don't use more than 2 colors per egg. More colors become too blended.
- only place a few eggs in the colander at a time. Too many and they break the shells.
- make sure you let them sit the full 5 minutes. Any less time and the colors will be pastel and muted (which is fine if you're going after that look).

The science behind it: Vinegar breaks down and softens the shell of the egg so the color can adhere better. If you were to submerge your egg fully in vinegar the shell will dissolve in a day and you will have a "naked" egg in a bouncy membrane - a fun experiment to do you with your little one also!

The Bunny Fingerplay

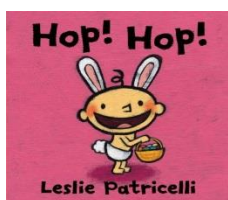
Here is a bunny (make a bunny with hand)

Happy Easter! by Liesbet Slegers: This fun picture book describes springtime and the different things we do to help celebrate Easter.
